



Eritrea's Winter Olympics Challenge!

Following the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Games held last summer, the Beijing 2022 Olympic Winter Games came to a close with much excitement. Six athletes from five countries were competing from the African continent in this Winter Olympics. From Eritrea, Mr. Shannon Abeda competed in the Alpine Skiing Men's Giant Slalom.

Mr. Shannon, Eritrea's first Winter Olympian, started ice skating at the age of 3. He initially wanted to be an ice hockey player, but decided against it due to his parents' opinion that it was too dangerous; in 2011, he decided to represent his parents' country of origin, Eritrea, in skiing, and was selected to compete in the 2012 Youth Olympic Games. Her parents fled the war in Eritrea in the 1980s and immigrated to Canada. "When I was seven or eight years old, I used to draw pictures of myself standing on the Olympic podium. As a child, you talk about these dreams, but I never thought I would be here," he said in an interview with the Olympic Channel at the PyeongChang 2018 Games.

Mr. Shannon, a weightlifter and programmer, suddenly announced his retirement from Alpine skiing immediately after Pyeongchang and considered switching to bobsledding. However, he resumed skiing in September 2021 with the goal of qualifying, and was relieved when he secured a slot in the Olympics three months later. "It's so surreal, it still doesn't sink in, I've officially qualified for my second Olympics. About two months ago, I was on the verge of throwing in the towel," he posted on his Instagram page. "I want to share more of my story and use my voice to inspire future generations of Winter Olympians from Eritrea and the Diaspora."

After the games, he said, "I wanted to build on the previous

Olympics and achieve a better result.

Unfortunately, in the last Games, I got caught up in small things and could not think about the bigger picture. I could not fully utilize my experience in Pyeongchang, and got too absorbed in the competition. I forgot to have fun itself."

However, Mr. Shannon, competing for the second time after the previous event, was able to finish the Winter Olympics with a great result, placing 39th overall.

I was lucky enough to compete in the Olympic Judo Games in Tokyo, Japan earlier this year. Today, I am very happy to attend the opening ceremony of the new judo hall in Thimphu, Bhutan. First of all, I would like to express my gratitude to the Bhutan Judo Association and to all of you for giving me personally the opportunity to represent my country in the world's greatest sporting event, the Olympic Games. This was a great honor, a valuable experience and a once in a lifetime opportunity for me and I would like to express my sincere gratitude to the IOC, NOC, IJF, AJJF, SEISA Group, BJA and the founder of Bhutan Judo, Mr. Karma Dorji and Ms. Rie. I would also like to thank my coach, Yusuke Utashiro Sensei, for his support, hard work, enthusiasm, and patience. I would also like to thank my coaches who inspired me to start judo and have guided me to where I am today. Sensei Michihiro Yamazaki, Yoshihiro Horiuchi, and Miyu Uchida. I would like to thank Pema Dargay Sensei from

Bhutan for all her help throughout my ten years of judo. The four-time Olympian, Austrian Judo National Team Captain, and International Judo Ambassador, Ms. Sabrina Filzmoser for her support of Bhutan and the Himalayas. Thank you for your long support of judo in the region. ~ omission~ Ten years ago, judo was not developed at all in Bhutan and was an unknown sport. Today, more and more people know about judo in Bhutan. We, the members of the Bhutan Judo Association,

Success in the 2021 Asian Youth Para Games!

The 2021 Asian Youth Para Games (AYPG) was held in the Kingdom of Bahrain from November 27th to December 8th, 2021. The AYPG is an international all-round competition for young people with disabilities in the Asian region, organized by the Asian Paralympic Committee (APC). It has been held every four years in Asian countries since 2003. In 2009, the second edition was held in Tokyo, Japan, and in 2013, the third edition was held in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. The Asian Youth Para Games are an opportunity for young athletes to gain valuable international experience, and as a gateway to the Paralympic Games, many athletes who are currently active around the world have participated in the Asian Youth Para Games in the past. More than 1,500 athletes from 31 Asian countries participated in the Bahrain Games.

The Bhutan Paralympic Committee (BPC) made its debut at this year's Games, following the 2020 Tokyo Games. Ms. Sapna Subba, a high school student from Dagana, Bhutan, competed in the women's singles and mixed doubles in the SH6 (short stature) category. As a result, Ms. Sapna became the first Bhutanese para-athlete to win two bronze medals at international competitions. In the mixed doubles, she was paired with Mr. Tomoya Ueno of Japan.

In an interview after the games, she said, "I want to encourage people with disabilities to become more involved in the Paralympic Movement so that nothing is impossible. I feel fortunate to have represented Bhutan and to have won a medal. I was lucky to have support from my parents, my school, the Bhutan Badminton Federation, and the Bhutan Paralympic Committee"

For Ms. Sapna, Bahrain was her first time abroad. "The huge, tall buildings I saw in Bahrain were breathtaking," she said. "I was surrounded by many athletes, and their confidence and serious looks inspired me to work even harder. I want to continue

to practice hard and aim higher. I want to prove to myself and others that nothing is impossible, no matter what the circumstances. That it is important to have confidence no matter what difficulties you face. I want to communicate with others and enhance my inner strength," she said enthusiastically.

Bhutan Representative @ FINA World Swimming Championships

The 15th FINA World Swimming Championships, the international swimming championships to conclude the year 2021, was held in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. The FINA World Swimming Championships were held at the Etihad Arena on Yas Island from December 16th to 21st. The championships were attended by 943 swimmers from over 83 countries. Bhutanese swimmers Mr. Sangay Tenzin and Mr. Kinley Lhendup also participated in the championships. Mr. Sangay and Mr. Kinley have been training professionally for more than two years in Phuket, Thailand, with swimmers from more than a dozen countries, under the auspices of FINA (International Swimming Federation). Mr. Sangay was the only representative from the Kingdom of Bhutan to make his debut at the 2020 Tokyo Games last summer as a special quota swimmer recommended by the IOC and FINA.

On December 16th, Mr. Kinley set a new national record in the men's 200m individual medley with a time of 2:24, followed by a time of 1:01 in the men's 100m butterfly on December 17th, both national records and personal records. He finished 5th in the group stage and 79th/88th overall. "I think the result was not all bad, but I am not satisfied," said Mr. Kinley.

On December 18th, Mr. Sangay set a national and personal

record in the 50m freestyle with a time of 26.29 seconds. He finished first in the group stage. However, he was not able to qualify for the finals as he finished 83rd out of 106 swimmers overall. Mr. Sangay also competed in the 100m freestyle.

Two said that Bhutanese swimmers still need to work hard to reach the semi-finals and finals. "The biggest problem we face is the lack of opportunities to compete, the lack of places to practice in the Kingdom of Bhutan. We need to work harder and harder."

Immediately after the burning down of the main building of Shuri Castle on 31st October 2019, the SEISA Group received donations through FGC at various events, including the acceptance of relief funds. After searching for ways to continue supporting the reconstruction, FGC and SEISA Kokusai Okinawa and Naha jointly set up the "Shuri Castle Reconstruction Support Project Team". Students and staff from both schools also thought about what they could do and decided to produce and sell Shuri Castle Design tote bags using the traditional Okinawan dyeing and weaving technique 'Bingata', and to donate the proceeds to charity.

They asked a wide range of questions, including sympathy for SEISA's educational activities and the success of Yuma KAGIYAMA in

the Olympics. The students were asked questions and helped to relieve their nerves. They were particularly pleased with the messages they received from people all over Japan when they purchased tote bags. The foundation officials said they would like to display them and the tote bags on the notice board at the management center in the park. At the end of the event, the student representatives of the project presented the donation, received a letter of appreciation and took a commemorative photograph.


