After graduating, they entered SEISA University Accommodation Course to continue their activities.

When they first arrived in Japan, they didn't understand any Japanese, and in addition to the language barrier, they were confused by cultural differences and had many difficult experiences. Despite all of this, they never gave up and continued to strive forward. They have grown a lot and are now able to communicate entirely in Japanese.

In track and field, each of them has even gone so far as to represent their home country in international competitions. Above all, these two, who were supported and loved by many people, became symbols of the "bridge between Africa and Asia" that the late former chairperson of FGC and SEISA Group, Yasuo Miyazawa, had hoped for.

On September 19th, Mr. Dejen and Mr. Penjor graduated from university. On the graduation day, their teachers and coaches came to celebrate, and also His Excellency Estifanos Afewoki, Ambassador of Eritrea to Japan, was in attendance. Introduction to the culture of the Republic of Mali ~Mud Architecture~

Mr. Almame, a sports scholarship student who came to Japan in May this year, has been working hard on basketball and studying in the second semester after his first summer vacation in Japan. In Japanese, he has mastered hiragana and katakana and is now learning kanji. In basketball, he is gradually making a name for himself, and his team is winning more and more often against teams of higher ranks.

We introduce the culture of Mr. Almame's home country, the Republic of Mali. In this first installment, we introduce Mali's mud architecture. Mali is a country with a rich culture of musical excellence, dance, painting, and folk art and has a deep history behind it. Once known as the "Golden Kingdom", today there are four sites that are registered as World Heritage Sites. One of them is the "Old Towns of Djenne", which has a history dating back to BC. Djenne is located in the middle of the Niger River, the great river that flows through West Africa, and prospered at the end of the 13th century as a transit point for gold that crossed the Sahara Desert.

A distinctive feature of Old Towns of Djenne is its traditional mud-built architecture. Huge mosques, houses, and other buildings built of mud have "terron", or pieces of wood, built into the walls. The facades of the buildings represent the various members of a family: father, mother, and children, with the number of dots representing the number of children.

The Kingdom of Bhutan Graduates and others participate in international competitions

After graduating from SEISA University on September 19th, Mr. Penjor left for Hangzhou, China on September 25th without a moment to catch his breath. This is to represent the Kingdom of Bhutan at the Asian Games. This time, he and four other SEISA graduates participated in the Asian Games as representatives of the Kingdom of Bhutan. Here we report on the current state of Bhutanese sports, which continues to grow and compete in international competitions.

Asian Games Four graduates represent the Kingdom of Bhutan

The 19th Asian Games, considered the Asian version of the Olympics, was held in Hangzhou, China from September 23rd to October 8th. The Kingdom of Bhutan sent a team of 28 athletes, the largest in its history, including Ms. Sonam Choden, a gradu ate of SEISA Kokusai High School Shonan, represented recurve archery, Mr. Tandin Wangchuk, a graduate of SEISA Dohto University, represented the judo 73kg class, and Mr. Kinley Tsher ing represented the judo 66kg class, and SEISA University gradu ate Mr. Tshering Penjor represented the short distance 200m and 400m track and field events.

The Bhutanese athletes also participated in the Asian Para Games, which was held following the Asian Games. Four athletes, including Ms. Chimi Dema (women's shot put) and Mr. Pema Rigsel (men's archery), became Bhutan's first ever Paralympic athletes at the Tokyo Paralympic Games and had a pre-camp at the SEISA Hakone Campus, participated in the Games.

The World Aquatics Championships - Fukuoka 2023

Bhutanese athletes visited Japan

Prior to the Asian Games, the World Aquatics Championships - Fukuoka 2023 was held from July 14th to 30th, and athletes from the King dom of Bhutan also participated in the event. The World Aquatics Championships is the second most important swimming event after the Summer Olympics, and was the second time in 22 years that the championships were held in Japan, the first being in Fukuoka 2001.

Two Bhutanese athletes represented Bhutan at the Games. Mr. Sangay Tenzin, who also partic ipated in the Tokyo Olympics, competed in the 200m freestyle and 100m freestyle, while Mr. Kinley Lhendup, another representative, com peted in the 200m individual medley and 100m butterfly. Mr. Sangay recorded his second personal best in the 100m freestyle and also set a new personal best in the 200m freestyle. Mr. Kinley, on the other hand, came to Japan for the first time in this competition. He set a new personal best in the 200m individual medley and a second personal best in the 100m butter fly. Mr. Sonam, Secretary General of the Bhutan Olympic Committee (BOC), also visited Japan for a meeting to discuss future collaboration between Bhutan, FGC, and SEISA Group.
